

GIRL RECOGNITIONS IN 2006

There will be two Council-sponsored Recognitions Celebrations for Teens in 2006. Both will be held on April 23, 2006, at the Amway Grand Plaza in Grand Rapids. The Girl Recognitions Celebration will celebrate the following Girl Recognitions: Graduating Seniors, the Bronze Award, the Silver Award, and the Ten Year Pin. The Gold Award Banquet will celebrate the Gold Award, Senior Scholarship, Community Responsibility Scholarship, and the Lisa Verbrugge Service Award.

All Cadette and Senior Scouts and Advisors are being asked to identify the Recognitions for which they are eligible. In order to receive the award, all applications and report forms required for each award must be submitted **directly to Girl Scouts of Michigan Trails** with an RSVP to the event, **no later than February 10, 2006**. Cadette & Senior Girl Scouts are accountable for communicating all information directly to the Council by February 10, although they may need assistance from their advisor or Neighborhood Recognitions Committee in gathering information together! **The forms in this packet are for your information and may be duplicated for advisors and Cadette/Senior Girl Scouts.** Please note that teens may earn awards at any time, but formal recognition occurs each spring, and teens have until February 10, 2006 to complete all requirements for recognition that spring.

COUNCIL RECOGNITION AWARDS

The following awards will be given at the Girl Recognitions Celebration on April 23, 2006.

<u>AWARD</u>	<u>REQUIREMENTS</u>
Ten Year Pin	The Ten Year Pin represents <i>10 girl years of active Girl Scout membership</i> , in preparation for leadership and service. This pin, awarded at our Girl Recognitions Celebration in the spring, symbolizes each girl's ten year commitment to the goals of Girl Scouting: Developing Values, Developing Self Potential, Relating to Others and Contributing to Society. Girls will be recognized on April 23, 2006 at the Girl Recognitions Celebration.
Silver Award	The Silver Award is the highest honor a Cadette Girl Scout can earn. This commitment requires determination and responsibility. Each recipient must earn interest project patches, focus books, demonstrate leadership skills, career award, and complete the Girl Scout 4B Award. Group projects are acceptable, but project proposals must reflect each individual's 40 hours of project responsibilities. Teens are eligible to earn the Silver Award until September 30 of their final Cadette year. Each Silver Award recipient receives a Silver pin symbolizing her outstanding achievement at the Girl Recognitions Celebration on April 23, 2006.
Graduating Senior	All 2006 graduating seniors will be recognized at the April 23, 2006, Girl Recognitions Celebration.
Bronze Award	Highest award for Junior Girl Scouts. Three requirements and a project are required to be completed. Junior Girl Scouts who complete the final report form will be recognized at the annual Girl Recognitions Celebration to be held April 23, 2006.

Mackinac Island Honor Scouts

MIHS are a group of 60 7th-12th grade girls who give service to the State of Michigan by acting as official guides at Fort Mackinac and other historical sites on Mackinac Island for one week in July.

Face It Teens

Face It is a team of 10th – 12th grade girls and adult advisors committed to “facing it” with the Girl Scouts by presenting one hour workshops to troops in Kent and Ottawa Counties. Face It workshops touch on contemporary issues, encouraging girls to make healthy choices which benefit the world around them.

Kids on the Block

Kids on the Block is a group of 6th -12th grade girls that serve as puppeteers who present shows to Daisy and Brownie Girl Scouts on cultural awareness and bullying. Kids on the Block and Peace Makers form the Michigan Trails Peace Project.

Peace Makers

Peace Makers are a group of 6th – 12th grade girls trained in conflict resolution and bullying prevention. Peace Makers use this knowledge to present one hour workshops enabling the girls in our council to peacefully resolve conflict and defend themselves from bullies.

The Girl Scout Gold Award Banquet honors and presents our 2005-2006 Girl Scout Gold Award recipients, as well as the 2006 recipients of the Lisa Verbrugge Service Award, the Senior Scholarship, and the Community Responsibility Scholarship. *All Girl Scout Gold Award recipients, Scholarship recipients and Lisa Verbrugge Service Award recipient will each receive a complimentary ticket for the banquet.* All others may purchase tickets for the event. AWARD	REQUIREMENTS
Gold Award	Recipients submit the Final Project Report Form with a picture for publication, and participate in a final interview with the Teen Awards Committee.
Lisa Verbrugge Service Award	Nomination from a Senior Advisor for Outstanding Service. Selected by the Teen Awards Committee.
Senior Scholarship Recipient	The recipient must meet requirements and submit all paperwork. Selected by the Teen Awards Committee. The Senior Scholarship, a \$500.00 award given annually to one Senior Girl Scout, recognizes her time and effort contributed to Girl Scouting, and her intent to continue service as an adult Girl Scout.
Community Responsibility Scholarship	Up to \$6,000.00 scholarship each are presented annually by Olivet College, to outstanding graduating Senior Girl Scouts who have made significant contributions to their communities in the areas of service and volunteerism. This award is given to promote a lifelong commitment toward community responsibility.

Michigan Trails will purchase all the awards to be given out at both celebrations!

OPPORTUNITIES ABOUND FOR GRADUATING SENIOR GIRL SCOUTS

BRIDGING TO ADULT GIRL SCOUTING

By the conclusion of your time as a Senior Girl Scout, you will have acquired an array of experiences and skills. You may choose to bridge to adult Girl Scouting; you can volunteer your time to your council or directly to girls as a leader of a troop/group. Perhaps you might even want to choose Girl Scouting as a profession. The points below will help you develop a plan to continue your journey as a Girl Scout.

BRIDGE TO ADULT STEPS:

- * Find out how Girl Scouting is organized in your community.
- * Find out about the volunteer positions that are open to adults.
- * Interview professional Girl Scout staff and find out what kinds of education and experience are needed for key positions.
- * Find out about training available for adults, and if possible, participate in an adult training event.
- * Take on a leadership role in Girl Scouting working with adults. This might be as a Senior Girl Scout Program Aide, a Leader-in-Training, a Counselor-in-Training, a Senior Girl Scout Troop Assistant, an Apprentice Trainer, or a member of an event task group or board committee.
- * Help plan a bridging ceremony in which you receive your Bridge to Adult Girl Scout pin. Once you have bridged, you may register as an adult and wear the adult uniform.

BECOMING A CAMPUS GIRL SCOUT

Once you continue your Girl Scout career by bridging to the adult level, you may choose to attend a college, a vocational or technical school, or other institute of higher learning. At that time, you may join or organize a Campus Girl Scout group through your local Council. Young adults, with or without Girl Scout experience, may register as members of a Campus Girl Scout group.

Some activities that Campus Girl Scouts may carry out include: event planning, Girl Scout troop/group sponsorship, program leadership, project management, public relations, recruitment activities, fund development, public relations, research projects, camping or other outdoor events, and mentoring programs. Many of the experiences as a Campus Girl Scout can lead to career opportunities and professional experience in your field of interest.

Check with your local Girl Scout Council or Girl Scouts of the USA headquarters in New York to inquire about existing Campus Girl Scout groups in your area, or steps to incorporating your own group.

OTHER TEEN RECOGNITIONS & SCHOLARSHIPS

Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA)

The Ronald McDonald House Charities, Youth Golf Scholarship, is an education scholarship sponsored by Ronald McDonald House Charities and awarded annually to a junior golfer from an LPGA Urban youth Golf Program, a LPGA Girls Golf Club, or an established junior golf program directed by an LPGA member. The objective is to grant an education scholarship to an individual from an LPGA junior program that is pursuing post high school education at an accredited institution of high education. Contact the council office for an application. Application deadline is June 30, 2006.

The Dinah Shore Scholarship, The Dinah Shore Scholarship of one of two awards granted annually through The LPGA Foundation and the Dinah Shore Scholarship Fund. The objective of the Dinah Shore Scholarship award is to grant a scholarship to a female high school senior who played golf during high school and is pursuing a college education, but will not be pursuing playing golf. Contact the council office for an application. Application deadline is June 30, 2006.

The Marilyn Smith Scholarship, The Marilyn Smith Scholarship is granted annually through The LPGA Foundation and the Marilyn Smith Scholarship Fund. The objective of the Marilyn Smith Scholarship award is to grant a scholarship to a female high school senior who played golf during high school and is pursuing a college degree in education or business and playing collegiate golf. Contact the council office for an application. Application deadline is June 30, 2006.

Elks Scholarship

The Most Valuable Student contest awards 500 scholarships to the country's top students. The scholarships are for students pursuing a four-year degree, on a fulltime basis (minimum of 12 semester hours), at a U.S. college or university. (Students may enroll at a two-year college for the first two years of the four-year program.). Information is available at www.girlscouts.org.

Additional Scholarships

There are many other higher education organizations that provide scholarships to Gold Award recipients. Colleges and Universities in increasing numbers are beginning to recognize the merits of the Girl Scout experience by awarding and making available scholarships and grants for Girl Scouts and recipients of the Girl Scout Gold Award. Senior Girl Scouts are encouraged to check with their high school guidance counselor or with the financial aid office at the school they wish to attend for information on other scholarships that might be available to Girl Scouts or Gold Award recipients.

Although the more than 50 schools included in the scholarship listing are registered, accredited institutions, GSUSA does not perform on-site visitations. We strongly encourage prospective students to thoroughly examine the academic and social environment the institution offers. As with the acceptance of admission to any college, girls and their parents should investigate the school to ensure it provides the desired educational challenges and social atmosphere.

GIRL SCOUTS OF MICHIGAN TRAILS OLIVET COMMUNITY RESPONSIBILITY SCHOLARSHIP

OVERVIEW

Established in 1998, Olivet College (Olivet) and Girl Scouts of Michigan Trails began the Community Responsibility Scholarship Awards. These awards are given to outstanding graduating Senior level Girl Scouts that have made significant contributions in the areas of service and volunteerism. Scholarships up to \$6000 are awarded annually. All financial awards will be applied to study at Olivet (tuition, room, and board).

PURPOSE

1. To recognize outstanding contributions in the areas of community service and volunteerism.
2. To afford an opportunity for further education through recognition and awarding of community responsibility.
3. To provide up to \$6000 of financial assistance to Olivet College for graduating Senior Girl Scouts, to be used toward their freshman year at Olivet.
4. To promote a lifelong commitment towards community responsibility.

ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible for this award a girl should:

1. Be an active and registered Senior Girl Scout entering grade 12 in the fall of 2005.
2. Provide documentation of **AT LEAST** 100 hours of community service within the last calendar year in or outside Girl Scouting.
3. Submit a typed application with essay, documented service, and two recommendations to Girl Scouts of Michigan Trails, by deadline.
4. Maintain at least a 2.5 high school grade point average, and submit high school transcript or current report card with scholarship application.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF THE SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

Submissions of a completed application include all of the following:

1. Completed, typed and signed application form with essay.
 2. Documentation of a minimum of 100 service hours.
 3. Two (2) Scholarship Recommendations:
One by a high school teacher or counselor.*
One by an active adult Girl Scout (not related to the applicant).

OVERVIEW

Each year, the Lisa Verbrugge Service Award recognizes one Senior Girl Scout who has shown exceptional involvement and personal initiative in her troop, council and wider community. Lisa Verbrugge was a Michigan Trails Girl Scout who died in 1983, the summer after graduating from high school. She was a hard working, fun-loving young woman who was very involved in volunteer work in Girl Scouting, in her school, in her church, and at an area hospital. We remember her as we honor each year's recipient. All nominations must include the following:

ELIGIBILITY

- Senior Girl Scouts should *not* be aware of their nomination.
- The nominee must be a currently registered active member of GSUSA.
- Nomination must be made by a **Senior Girl Scout Troop Leader**.
- Letters of recommendation from two other adults are required.
- A record of service during the girl's Senior years must be included.
- Nominations must be submitted to the Service Center by the deadline. The Award will be presented by Bert Verbrugge at our Gold Award Banquet on April 23, 2006.
